diameter was discovered on the Miami River's south bank during excavation to construct a residential building; it was uncovered and found to be an artifact from the Native American tribe Tequesta. Following the city's acknowledgement of the artifact's historical significance, the state bought the area for \$26.7 million. In order to preserve the artifact, it was reburied in 2003 and informative signs were placed.
