The organization's key priorities include creating a welcoming environment for businesses, enhancing quality of life for residents, advocating for smart urban planning and attracting visitors.

Our board of directors is comprised of downtown property owners, business owners and/or residents, ensuring that we understand the issues affecting the Downtown community.

Who does the Miami DDA serve

The Miami DDA serves the many residents, investors, business owners and visitors that make up our unique downtown Miami ecosystem, from the Arts & Entertainment District, through the Central Business District and Brickell. Whether it's a small business owner who needs assistance getting a permit to open their new shop, or a family looking for free and engaging activities to do with their kids right in their neighborhood, the Miami DDA's efforts and programming are designed to serve all who call Downtown Miami home.

The facts about the Miami DDA's budget

- The Miami DDA serves the needs of our Downtown residents, business owners and visitors. A few examples of initiatives funded by the Miami DDA include:
 - Enhancing police services by funding off duty officers for up to 650 hours per month and a security camera network, with 21 cameras and eight license plate readers currently in service
 - Cleaning and maintaining public areas through the Downtown Enhancement Team,
 comprised of all formerly homeless individuals (see attached Quality of Life report)
 - Offering additional hospitality and security-related services through our Downtown Ambassadors, who provide information and assistance while serving as additional eyes and ears for City of Miami Police



- o Expanding homeless outreach with grants to add shelter options and services
- Improving mobility with the Freebee Downtown Circulator, which has had more than
 23,000 riders since launch, and the planned Brickell Circulator
- Bringing family-friendly and cultural activations to the urban core through the
 Downtown Creative Collaborator Grants, set to launch July 1, and Holiday Village
- Welcoming new and needed businesses with Business Incentive Grants and supporting more than 700 businesses to-date with the free Permit Clinic
- Creating engaging urban spaces for the community to enjoy, such as advocating for the I-395 Baywalk Pedestrian and Bikeway Bridge
- Empowering stakeholders with vital information and resources like the 3D
 Development Pipeline Map to inform development, policy and investment decisions that benefit Downtown Miami
